TO BETHLEHEM

'Let us now go even unto Bethlehem.' - S. Luke ii. 15

The soul goes forth on pilgrimage and comes to the Church of God. It may find the conventional Church trouble when it makes its demand for truth and reality, as did those seekers who came to ask the way to the birthplace of the King. But the Church nevertheless holds the secret of God's presence, and, with all its faults, can point the soul to Bethlehem.

Those ancient kings, those three symbolic souls, came to Bethlehem, the House of Bread. They found the sacramental life. The found One Who did not disappoint life but fulfilled it, Who did not crush their senses but claimed them as His own, for through their senses in a spiritual way He revealed Himself. They found a little Babe, the humanest of all human things, and yet that most human thing revealed to them the Divine Life, and they learnt the secret of life - that life was for God's self-expression and their own self-fulfillment. They learnt what it was to come to God, and know God coming to them, in a sacramental way. They saw that material things could become indwelt with spiritual realities, and be the medium of their communication, and that the senses could become sacrificial and expressive of a devotion both real and costly.

Obedience to the Church is the reasonable attitude of humility in the presence of great experience, knowledge, and holiness. We do find controversies and worldliness in the Church, but the life of prayer and sacramental experience is always there, and in that life the soul finds the spiritual Bethlehem, the Holy Child and His Blessed Mother.



Our second Christmas event is on December 20, 2019, at 7:00 pm at the Church.

"Cookies, Cocoa, and Carols" is a pre-Christmas caroling service. The service is based upon a Caroling Service that we used to hold on the Christmas Eve before the late service. It consists of readings, music sung by the Choir, and Congregational Singing. Refreshments will be served. Again, if you need a ride, please let me know.

We have hung three stained-glass-like banners in the Nave. These banners show the Nativity with the Shepherds and Wise Men. There are three more banners which will be hung during the Easter Season.



Christians are a people of prayer and we should all be praying several times a day. I've recommended in the past that you say the Daily Office everyday. But in case you can't do that,

here are two short prayer services that you can say in the morning and evening. They can easily be memorized.

Morning Prayer

I laid down and slept, and rose up again; * for the LORD sustained me. (*Psalm* 3:5)

O God, thou art my God, * early will I seek thee. In the morning I will direct my prayer unto thee, * and will look up. (*Psalm* 63:1, 5:3b)

Veni, Creator Spiritus

Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire, / And lighten with celestial fire.

Thou the anointing Spirit art, / Who dost thy sevenfold gifts impart.

Thy blessed unction from above, / Is comfort, life, and fire of love.

Enable with perpetual light / The dulness of our blinded sight.

Anoint and cheer our soilèd face / With the abundance of thy grace.

Keep far our foes, give peace at home; / Where thou art guide, no ill can come.

Teach us to know the Father, Son, / And thee, of both, to be but One;

That, through the ages all along, / This may be our endless song: Praise to thy eternal merit, / Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Thou art the King of Glory, O Christ. / Thou

art the everlasting Son of the Father.

St. Richard's Prayer

Senior Warden's report

Greetings from your senior warden.

As we close on the end of 2019, let's spend time reflecting on the blessings God has provided this year. We have an engaged, interactive congregation that enjoys worshiping our Lord and Savior and fellowshipping with each other.

Though we would like to grow the Church to insure its continued existence, we need to be pleased with the current internal relationships.



We completed phase 2 of the conversion to LED lighting in November, all of the parking lot lights and the florescent bulbs have been changed to LED. The spotlights in the Church are all now LED. Paul is leading an effort to change out all of the incandescent bulbs around the outside of the Church to LED. There are still a couple of spotlights that I need to change out at the front of the Church. This will leave only the sconces inside the Church to change. If you have seen any LED sconces recently that would look good in the Church, please let Becca or me know.

The recent phase 2 changes came at a cost of about \$3,500.00 for all of the work performed but with the ComEd rebates the actual bill paid by the Church was only about \$450.00. As we continue to change to LED our electric bill will also continue to be reduced.

December 7th is the annual Church Christmas party, please sign up on the sign up sheet so we can track the number of people coming and who is bringing edibles for general consumption. The ACM will provide beverages as is our usual practice.
